

### PALOS VERDES GOLF CLUB

#### 3301 Vía Campesina

Opened in 1924 when there was barely a house or a tree on the hill. It was designed by Billy Bell and George Thomas, who also famously designed the Bel Air and Riviera Golf Clubs - this was referred to as the Golden Age of golf course design. The Club House underwent a major remodel in the early 2000s, with a goal of maintaining the look of the original.

### MALAGA COVE LIBRARY

#### 2400 Via Campesina

Malaga Cove Library opened in 1930 and was designed by Myron Hunt, who also designed the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. It was originally known as the Palos Verdes Public Library and Art Gallery. The building is five stories with lots of windows to provide an abundance of natural light. The style of the library is known as Mediterranean Revival. It was dedicated as a local historical site in December 1980 during its 50th year of operation. It's described as "a benchmark in the age of Southern California stucco architecture."

### LUNADA BAY FOUNTAIN

#### Palos Verdes Dr. West and Yarmouth Rd

The story of the Lunada Bay Fountain is a funny tale about a woman who wanted something and made it happen. The fountain was a gift in 1965 from Jeane Burke, a resident of Rocky Point in Lunada Bay. She organized neighborhood children to raise funds for the fountain. This is why a plaque at the fountain displays the fountain's name as: "La Fuente de los Ninos" (the fountain of the children). When asked why she was inspired to create a fountain at the intersection, Mrs. Burke replied, "Well, I didn't want to say, "Turn at the gas station to get to my home." How about that for a reason?

## WAYFARER'S CHAPEL

#### 5755 Palos Verdes Dr S.

Wayfarers Chapel began as a dream of Elizabeth Schellenberg who lived on the Palos Verdes Peninsula in the late 1920s. Schellenberg dreamed of a little chapel on a hillside above the Pacific Ocean where wayfarers could stop to rest. Architect Lloyd Wright, was urged to apply his genius to the project. The church was completed in 1951. The Wayfarers Chapel, also known as "The Glass Church", was built using wood and glass and designed to make visitors feel like they were in a forest.
